RWANDA IMPACT REPORT

Yobel International traveled to Rwanda to offer an entrepreneurial training course to men and women living within one of six reconciliation villages.

You\ may have heard of the 1.2 billion people in the world today who are living on less than \$1 USD per day? Well, we were here to train 37 of them. The average income in the room was \$16 USD per household per month. Collectively, these entrepreneurs were supporting 133 children – on a total of \$640 per month.

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These men and women are overcomers. Having both survived the genocide and learned to repent, forgive and reconcile amongst themselves has resulted in a people that know how to persevere. Although many villagers were illiterate, lacking confidence, and very poor, they arrived each day ready to learn entirely new concepts such as how to use a calculator, how to create a budget, how to treat customers with love. They left knowing that they ARE capable of beginning new businesses and have dreams of opening hair salons, grocery stores, and stationary boutiques. They plan to offer employment to 30 individuals in their small community. This training is 'karamay' they said. It will remain to benefit the village a long time.
